Textures and Squares Headband



Some people prefer vibrant designs, while others opt for plush, velvety textures. This pattern combines colors and stitching to create a tactile experience. By using at least two colors, the slip stitch design forms small windows that provide a distinct soft and geometric feel, intriguing to the touch. The knitted material is thick, offering warmth on cold days.

Notes:

This pattern was created on thin yarn and small needles. It easily can be adapted to larger yarn and needles. Simply adjust the repeating areas of the pattern or create a larger headband. This pattern has a natural curl to it due to the way the stitches lay. Either block the curl out, or see it disappear when the headband is sewn together and worn a couple times. Working loosely will also decrease the amount of curl. Add repeats if you want a wider headband.

Materials:

Knitting needles size3
Yarn in size 2 Yarn Bee was used in the creation of this pattern
(yarn needs to be in at least 2 contrasting colors for the design to show up)
Yarn needle for sewing and weaving in ends

Gauge:

This pattern makes little square windows, lined by ridges. Gauge is not important but this pattern was worked in: 7 sts per inch

Abbreviations:

K – knit

P - purl

SI – slip stitch

St(s) – stitch/stitches

CO - cast on

BO bind off

RS - right side

WS – wrong side

[] – section to be repeated across row

How to:

For instruction, the yarn will be called color A and color B. If using more than two colors, adjust as needed.

Slip stitches purlwise with yarn in back on RS, and yarn in front for WS.

CO 26 color A

Row 1: K all sts color A, turn

Row 2: K all sts color A, turn

Row 3: [SI 2 color A, k 2 color B], until last 2 sts. SI 2. Turn

Row 4: [SI 2 color A, p 2 color B], until last 2 sts. SI 2, turn

Repeat rows 1 through 4 until desired length ending on a row 4.

Repeat rows 1 and 2.

BO color A

Example for the pattern was a repeat of (rows 1-4) 64 or 65 times. Or desired length.

Sew ends together straight or fold ends in half and merge/sew to create a "twist."

Optional.:

As in the sample photo, this can have the colors reversed halfway through to give it an interesting color change.
